Summer tour features several stops in Northeast

We all had a great time together with the JOY of being with old friends, and the JOY of meeting new friends like Bob & sweet Laurie DuBose from California. Once we all got accustomed to the ship and the shower built for children, we all had FUN! First stop on the cruise was Nantucket, Ma. Even though it was raining buckets, we still enjoyed the tour of the town and its village full of cottages. Second stop was Martha's Vineyard which showed us the architectural homes of the whaling's golden age. Third stop was New Bedford, Ma. The museum held the world's largest global whaling and maritime history collections as well a half-scale replica whaling ship, whale skeletons, implements, log books, etc. Fourth stop was Newport, R.I., with its magnificient harbor full of beautiful sailing ships and yachts from all over the world. We toured the town of its many mansions including a walking tour of "The Breakers" the summer home of the Vanderbilts situated right on the Atlantic Ocean. Some of our folks even enjoyed a ride on one of the America's Cup Sailing ships.

Fifth stop was Block Island, R.I., a beautiful town with its bluffs overlooking the ocean, and a fun tour of their unusual old lighthouse. Here some people enjoyed the Block Island Eco Tour in a kayak. Then we went over to the west side of the island of New Harbor near the Great Salt Pond. We docked back in Warren R.I. where we visited the dairy farm of Paul & Diane Miller who had 1,200 Holsteins. Paul was OYF winner in 1981, and their son David was OYF National winner of 2000. We rode through Hartford, Ct. and moved on into Wallingford where we visited Joe DeFrancesco's vegetable farm and farm store. Joe & Ida were NOYF winners in 2016. We visited the nearby Geremia Greenhouse in Wallingford. This was fascinating with its flowers, nursery stock industry and greenhouse technology. Joey Geremia was so kind to let us walk through the greenhouses and even offered the ladies to take home flowers. He had the most beautiful stock of orchids. Joe Geremia is the first grower from the horticulture industry to win National the OYF award.

At Guilford-Mystic Seaport we visited Bishop's Orchards, a beautiful 147 year old farm producing apples, peaches, and their own wine. Keith Bishop, CEO of the company, received the Connecticut OYF award in 1985. Then we went on to the Noank Aquaculture Co-Op. Jim Markow runs the Noank hatchery on Long Island, where he grows the oyster seedlings on several thousand acres, all underwater. He sells seedlings to other oyster farmers who "plant" them in Long Island Sound and harvest in a 2- year cultivation period, resulting in one of the finest oysters in the world called the "Noank" oyster, also known as the "Mystic Oyster." We toured the Mystic Seaport Museum, home of more than 500 historic watercraft including the 1841 whaleship "Charles W. Morgan."

We were all so grateful for a beautiful trip, just wish everyone could have come along.

What an exciting year 1965 was for us getting to fly to Ft. Collins, Colorado to compete in the National NOYF. We had probably never been that far from home or seen more than a half inch of snow. The highlight of our trip was George Maxey, who was our year. He invited all the contestants out to his farm and prepared a

This worked so well together because Richard could keep most of the farm equipment running and his brother could keep the records on the dairy herd. We both decided we needed help

NOYF WINNER'S SPOTLIGHT **Brad and Molly Judson (MS 2017)**

Brad and Molly Judson operate a row crop farm in Mississippi where they raise cotton, corn, soybeans, and wheat. They were named NOYF winners at the Awards Congress in February 2017. Below, they share some more information about their operation and their experience at NOYF.

Brad is a third generation farmer. His father left farming in the 1980s to work for the Mississippi Department of Agriculture, so Brad solely started a new farm from scratch after he finished college in 2000.

We have made a lot of progress in the past 17 years obtaining more land and working on irrigating as much of it as we can. We would like to increase our acreage enough so that farming is an option for our sons Hamp (14) and Howie (12) if that is what they want to do for a living. Our focus with growing in acreage is to obtain land that is or can be irrigated.

Finding enough quality ground to lease or purchase has been a challenge. Also, trying to find enough credible information and articles to be

a positive face for agriculture on social media has been a struggle.

Prior to being nominated for NOYF, we had no idea that this organization existed, but at this point we could not imagine not meeting all of the members. It was awesome to meet 18 people who come from such different areas but were so much like us. I am sure over time, as we talk more and visit each other at home, so much is out there for us to learn from each other.

The OFA Class of 2017 has stayed in touch since last year, and in talking we have realized that we have all worked countless hours. None of us knows a

40 hour work week. NYOF made each of us stop and take a look at our accom-



plishments. We all stay so busy and focused that we sometimes forget to stop and look at what we have done. We all agreed that the application process was an eye opening revelation as to how far we have come.

We cannot wait to see everyone again. California, here we come!







NOYF WINNER'S SPOTLIGHT

Chad and Deb Bremmer (IL 2017)

Chad and Deb Bremmer were named NOYF winners at the Awards Congress in February 2017. They live near Pearl City, Illinois, where they have a diversified crop operation growing soybeans, alfalfa, rye, and dairy replacement heifers. They have three children: Ben, 13, Ethan, 10, and Eli, 8. Below, they tell us a little more about their operation and their experience with NOYF.

We are the fourth generation to raise corn, soybeans, alfalfa, and rye on 2,400 acres. We also custom raise dairy replacement heifers for two local dairies from weaning to springers with around 750 head on feed here. We farm with my brother Ross and his family and my parents, Ron and Karen. Deb is a registered nurse and works part time in the GI De-

partment at FHN hospital.

We consider our operation unique for a few reasons. First, my parents had the foresight to form a corporation when my brother and I started farming after college to allow us to buy into the operation right away. We became the sole owners and decision makers for the farm in our early 30s. While Dad still works on the farm daily and Mom keeps the farm books, they gave up control and allowed us to manage with their guidance. The corporation rents all the land and owns all the machinery and buildings. We each own land personally and rent it to the corporation as well.

Another unique part of our operation is that we are able to be involved in the

dairy industry without milking cows. The dairy heifers allow us to utilize forages such as alfalfa in our crop rotation and use cover crops such as cereal rye to be chopped for feed while helping to maintain and conserve our soils.

In 5 years, we hope to continue

doing what we love: farming! We are constantly trying to do the best job we can with every acre and animal that we have so that our operation will be profitable and sustainable for generations to come. We hope to continue to expand through purchasing and renting more land so our children can have the opportunity to farm if they so choose. We hope to continue hosting farm tours to help educate the non-farm public and promote agriculture in any way possible.

One of our biggest challenges in the last few years has been complying with EPA livestock regulations. We felt that we had good management practices, but after a federal EPA inspection, we were forced to move cattle off of pastures, build several runoff containment pits, and stop using some outdoor facilities. Consumers don't understand why our livestock is housed in buildings, yet the regulations won't allow them on pasture with supplemental feeding. Education is going to be key moving forward.

Our OFA/NOYF experience was nothing short of amazing! Our class had 10 very deserving couples who do outstanding work promoting a positive image of ag-

riculture. We all come from diverse backgrounds and experiences, yet we all have many things in common. We were honored to be included in this group. We were not sure what to expect as we travelled to South Carolina, but a few days later when we left we knew we had met new lifelong friends from all over this great country!
